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Tears of Joy for Bronze Benedict Mowl Takes Third in Snowboard Big Air

CHIESA IN VALMALENCO---As the sun rose on the Snow Eagle, one of the longest ski lifts in the world, heading up to Alpe Palù, the excitement of the USA Deaf Snowboarding squad was mounting. After all, it was the last snowboarding event of the 2019 Winter Deaflympics. And it was the Big Air—the name speaks for itself. You either go big, or you go home. The USA crew of Lauren Benedict Mowl, Sean Esson, Lauren Weibert and Hannah Wheatcroft were raring to add to the medal total for the United States—in fact, only snowboarders have earned medals for the United States so far in these Games.

Weather delays, venue changes and various issues led to changes in the schedule that affected the snowboarders. They did not compete for six days, and then they were forced to compete two days in a row. Already sore from the Slopestyle competition the previous day, the boarders had to dial into their innermost strength and mentality in order to hang some serious Big Air.

Lauren Weibert's first run was her cleanest and highest, as she flew above the ramp, using the method grab. Her score of 59.33 was her highest of the day, and when the snow settled, it earned her the Silver medal, adding another one to her ever-growing collection of medals.

Lauren Benedict Mowl's air time increased with every run she made—she was saving the best for her last run—she pushed the alpitude (high above the ramp) to the extreme, and executed a clean Indy grab. That move gave her 51.66 points for the run, locking down the Bronze medal.

Hannah Wheatcroft completed three clean, strong runs—the first run was her best, giving her a 48.66 score, good for fourth place.

Sean Esson's first run was his best one he threw down an underflip-540 method grab. The 70.66 points he earned on that run gave him the Bronze medal, his second medal in less than 24 hours.

Yesterday was another difficult day for USA Deaf Chess. They began the day with a loss to Mongolia, 0-4. It was the first time in these Games that the USA was shut out. Coach DeLuca had this to say—"the strange part was that they all played especially well this morning."

Byron Bridges had a good game until he made a mistake that lost a piece, leading to the loss. Branton Stewart was neck to neck with his opponent until late endgame, when his opponent managed to queen a pawn. Oscar Petrov was flat out winning until he started making a succession of mistakes. Abraham Glasser had the toughest matchup of the match versus their top player, a former graduate student at Gallaudet University who went on to get a PhD. Glasser battled his opponent, but was outsmarted at endgame.

In the afternoon, the men regrouped to tie India, 2-2. Glasser and Petrov both earned wins, while Stewart and Bridges were handed losses. USA Deaf Chess closes out their 2019 Winter Deaflympics experience with a 9AM match today against Germany.
