Chess Denies Germany the Gold

CHIAVENNA---On the very last day of the Team Chess competition, USA Deaf Chess was paired with Germany—one of the teams contending for a Gold medal.

Originally supposed to face Ukraine, the USA was told only yesterday morning that they would be playing Germany instead. Ukraine lost the top ranking after one of their players was disqualified for wearing a watch during play.

With nothing to lose, and everything to gain—the United States brought their "A" game. It paid off, as Oscar Petrov led the Americans with a stunning defeat of a renowned German International Master. Abraham Glasser played his opponent to a draw. Branton Stewart and Byron Bridges both took a loss. With the 1.5-2.5 score, Germany was denied the Gold medal.

During the medal ceremony, USA Deaf Chess was awarded a medal for their participation and fine performance in the 2019 Winter Deaflympics. Kazakhstan won the first ever Gold medal for Chess.
